



Dr. Henry Joseph Soldati

March 28, 1933 - February 19, 2024

Dr. Henry Joseph Soldati passed away peacefully from heart failure at his home on February 19, 2024, just one month shy of his 91st birthday. Henry was a caring, loving man who provided compassionate care to many patients and baby deliveries in his over 50 years as an OB/GYN doctor. A man of deep faith and a true gentleman, Henry loved his family above all else and was always a beacon of hope and inspiration to everyone he met.

Henry was born in Petaluma, California, on March 28, 1933, to Henry and Lorayne Soldati (Wall). He grew up in Petaluma, attending St. Vincent's grammar and high school. Henry and his sister, Sandra Von Raesfeld, were proud of their family histories in Petaluma, and always spoke fondly of their Sonoma County roots. After graduating high school in 1951, he attended Santa Clara University, where he earned a BS in Biology (premed) in 1955. He received his Doctor of Medicine degree from St. Louis University Medical School in 1959.

In 1956, Henry married the love of his life, Joanne Paolini, beginning a remarkable 67-year union that blessed them with six sons, 18 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. After graduating from medical school, Henry and Joanne returned to their Bay Area roots, moving to Daly City, as Henry took up his internship and residency at St. Mary's Hospital in San Francisco, an association that would continue for over 30 years. During that time, he was

active in many committees and took on many leadership positions in the hospital and the OB/GYN department, including Chief of the Medical Staff in 1979-80, and Chairman of the Board from 1983 to 1988, the first lay person to ever hold that position at St. Mary's. He also practiced at Seton Medical Center in Daly City and St. Luke's Hospital in San Francisco.

Although Henry retired from private practice in 1992, he continued his passion for delivering babies for another 16 years throughout the country in mostly underserved and underprivileged areas at over 60 locations. He always valued his remote work, as he continued to serve patients who truly needed help. This chapter of his life allowed him to further pursue his passions for history and geography, through watching sporting events and visiting historical sites throughout the country.

Henry was always there for his sons, coaching their baseball and basketball teams, and he held many volunteer roles at Our Lady of Mercy grammar school and St. Ignatius College Prep, where all his sons attended. He served as the St. Ignatius Men's Club President in 1981. Henry's biggest passion was his love of baseball, especially his beloved Giants, a passion that he has passed down to his future generations. He loved to attend his son's and grandchildren's sporting events, and even his eldest great-grandchildren in recent years. As many of those who knew him can attest, it was a joy to talk baseball with him, but it was very difficult to stump him on baseball trivia. He was also a voracious reader, and it was not uncommon for him to read several books simultaneously scattered around the house, even while doing chores and daily activities.

Henry is survived by his wife of 67 years, Joanne Soldati; his sons Mark (Cena), David (Mary), Michael (Lisa), Thomas (Sally), Timothy (Kathy) and John (Lucy); 17 grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; his sister Sandra Von Raesfeld, of Petaluma, CA; and numerous nieces and nephews. He was

predeceased by his parents, Henry and Lorayne Soldati, and grandson Bradford. Henry lived a wonderful life, and he will truly be missed by his family, friends and all those whose lives he touched. We know he passed peacefully with a final "Bye for Now" for all of us. We love you and we miss you.

Funeral mass will be held at 11:00 AM on Tuesday, March 5 at St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, 35 Liberty St. Petaluma, CA. Inurnment will immediately follow at Calvary Catholic Cemetery, 304 Magnolia Ave., Petaluma, CA.

“ I have just now learned of the passing of Dr. Soldati and am understandably deeply saddened. I was honored and privileged to sit next [literally] to Dr. Soldati for eight straight Saturdays [full days] in February-March of 1980 during a particularly momentous and intense Medical Staff hearing conducted at St. Mary's Hospital. Dr. Soldati's role in the proceeding was as the Chief of the Medical Staff and I served as legal counsel for the Medical Staff in a hearing that would determine whether a certain member of the Medical Staff would be stripped of Medical Staff membership. As was and is the unfortunate reality during such proceedings, Dr. Soldati [and I] would be the target of many barbs as we simply served in this very important exercise of peer review. Dr. Soldati was calm, composed, gracious, and gentlemanly throughout. Though he would be the last to praise himself or call attention to his good deeds, he stood out as a man of profound, quiet, and genuine good character. I will always remember him as one of that handful of men [along with my father] who modeled how one should conduct oneself. Since then, we would occasionally encounter each other, by happenstance, in the lower deck behind home plate at Candlestick during one of those brisk weekday night games where, in the late evenings, the crowd would be outnumbered by the circling seagulls. Dr. Soldati always greeted me warmly, but even though I did not yet have a family, I could sense that he was signaling me that I need not be concerned, he was enjoying these few hours alone in his thoughts.
